ALFIE'S PROFILE

ALFIE'S PROFILE

Click on each part of his profile to find out how he made it safer to be online.

ALFIE'S PROFILE PIC

His profile picture is a cartoon avatar, not his actual photo. You need to be careful sharing pictures of yourself. People can copy or edit photos you put online without you knowing. It also makes it easier for people to find your profile and know its you.

ALFIE'S USERNAME

His username doesn't include his real name. This means he can choose to only let friends and family he knows and trusts in real life be follow his profile. It also means that people won't know his real name, and can't pretend to be him without him knowing.

ALFIE'S PRIVACY SETTINGS

His privacy settings are set to only let friends see. This means he only people he knows and trusts in real life can see what he posts. That way, he won't get nasty comments from strangers, and people he doesn't know can't copy or edit his photos or videos.















ALFIE'S CLOTHING

His clothing is casual and not school uniform or something private, like pyjamas. This means that people won't be able to work out where he goes to school, so he won't have strangers trying to find him. It also means he won't be embarrassed by pics of him in private clothes being shared online.









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SHARING PHOTOS

Alfie loves making and sharing photos online. He has to be clever because sometimes sharing photos can be unsafe, if for example people you don't know can use the photo to work out where you live or go to school.









ALFIE WANTS TO...



1. Take a selfie in his bedroom, in front of a wall with family photos on it, as well as a certificate with his name and school on...

2. Take a silly and embarrassing photo and share it with his friends on an app which says it will delete it once it has been viewed...

3. Share a video of his band playing a song. He wants to share it on his bands page. Only people they know offline, like friends at school and family, will be able to see it...

4. Take a photo of himself and his friend Sam in their school uniform. He wants to share it on an app where anyone can see it....

SHARING PHOTOS

Alfie wants to share some photos. Help him work out which photos are safe to put on his profile, and which ones he should keep private.

Top tips for staying safe when playing games online!



✓ Never give away your personal information (like phone number, address or school) with other gamers – especially if you don't know them.

✓ The safest thing to do is only game with friends you know in real life.

 \checkmark If a gamer you don't know asks them to join them on another game or app tell a trusted adult.

LEGAL OR ILLEGAL?

Click each story. Everyone mentioned is under 18 years old... when you're done click HERE >



Sam deliberately takes some naked selfies after a shower. He thinks about it and decides not to send them to anyone and deletes them from his phone.

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Ellie shares a naked video of her ex-partner Max with some friends on a closed chat. Her friend Jessica then posts it on her feed to embarrass Max.

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Alfie sends a "dick pic" to Megan by mistake on an app that deletes images quickly. Megan screenshots the pic & saves it to show to a friend.









TAKE OR MAKE

Sam should not have taken the photos, but did the right thing by not sending the naked selfies to anyone and deleting them.

Deliberately taking or making "indecent images" (sexual/naked pictures or videos) of anyone under 18 is illegal. This includes children taking or making photos of themselves!

WHAT THE POLICE SAY

The National Police Chiefs' Council says that children taking indecent images should not be prosecuted (taken to court) for a first time offence. The incident will be investigated though to make sure everyone is safe. Repeat occasions though will be treated differently.

DISTRIBUTE OR SHOW

Ellie and Jessica did the wrong thing.

Knowingly sharing or showing "indecent images" of children under 18 to someone else, whether they are a child or an adult, is illegal. This includes children sharing photos of themselves with other children!

What Jessica did could be classed as "revenge porn" and is also illegal.

WHAT THE POLICE SAY

The National Police Chiefs' Council says that children sharing indecent images should not be prosecuted (taken to court) for a first time offence. The incident will be investigated though to make sure everyone is safe. Repeat occasions though will be treated differently.

POSSESSION

Alfie shouldn't have sent the picture as he still intended on sharing it, even if he sent it to the wrong person by mistake. Megan shouldn't have saved it either!

Knowingly having "indecent images" of anyone under 18 with the intention to show them to someone else is illegal. Megan also "made" an indecent image by screenshotting it.

The National Police Chiefs' Council says that children possessing indecent images should not be prosecuted (taken to court) for a first time offence. The incident will be investigated though to make sure everyone is safe. Repeat occasions though will be treated differently.

HOW IT FEELS

No one has the right to pressure someone else into sharing a nude image. Everyone has the right to say "no" if someone asks them to do something they're not comfortable with. Here are some ways to say no:

Someone you don't know: Ignore, block and report it to the social media site or CEOP so they cannot contact you anymore. Someone you know and like but are not in a relationship with: You may want to say no in a funny way. Look at the "Zipit" app for ideas. Someone you're in a relationship with: Let them know you're not comfortable. If they respect & care for you they should understand.

Childline is free, private and confidential. They only tell other people in exceptional situations.

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CEOP can help if someone is being sexually abused, e.g. someone has threatening a person to share pics.

GETTING HELP

If someone has sent nudes already they can:
Ask the person to delete it: most people won't want to share it so have an honest conversation;
Speak to a trusted adult: it might be embarrassing to start with but they can help you.
Report it to the social media site: social networks don't allow naked pics of under 18s.











CATFISH
